Examples of calls that are appropriate for a non-emergency operator include reporting:

- A residential, business or vehicle break-in that occurred on an earlier day
- The return of a runaway child
- Identification of additional lost or stolen property after making an initial report
- Lost property
- A hit and run traffic collision when no longer at the scene of the accident
